He was responsible for that. He showed the importance of reading at a time when the only source of books was the Brooklyn Public Library. And not well stocked with books. He would order books for the class to read. Red Badge of Courage, Billy Budd, Moby Dick.. Reading became the good disease that I contracted that year and found out there was no cure.

And like all Brooklyn kids we were tough in thought and sometimes in action. He knew that and tried to strengthen the thought part. I now realize that when I look back at the time he pinned me to the lockers and said “don’t be a wise guy”....cannot remember what I did ?

But the toughness of thought stayed with me.

The confidence of thought through reading and research. Served me well as an Intelligence Officer during the Vietnam War, and as a Commissioner for the City of New York.

Sorry I did not find out of his passing until recently . I last saw him at a class reunion in 2002. But I did know of his career at Saint Francis College with another great leader, Frank Macchiarola, former President of the Collage.

Now reading Brooklyn Existentialism. Pure Langiulli. No one will read this posting but me.

But that’s Ok because it gives me some good closure. I will return to it from time to time.

Maybe he will.
